1. INTRODUCTIONS

Subcommittee members, agency staff, and the general public introduced themselves to one another.

SUBCOMMITTEE DISCUSSION OF FINANCE AND GOVERNANCE ISSUES AFFECTING 2. THE TRANSPORT 2020 PROJECT

Co-Chair Dick Wagner welcomed Subcommittee members and asked members of the public if they wished to make a brief comment.

Royce Williams said that he supported a governance structure based on MPO boundaries, noting that the boundaries are developed using Census data.

Bob Schaefer said that the long-term system should be looked at when considering finance and governance issues, not just a small start-up. He suggested that traffic impacts would be a problem and that more public involvement is needed at these meetings.

Wagner then distributed and walked through a 2-page document summarizing various Transport 2020 financing issues. Various issues surrounding potential funding sources, such as property tax, sales tax and wheel tax, were discussed. He said that a tourism-oriented tax had not yet been researched.

Wagner said that, in terms of a regional sales tax, boundary issues would emerge from merchants concerned about cross-over sales leaving their area. He added that there is not much evidence of this happening, but that this was an issue in 1991 (when the Dane County sales tax was last discussed). Wagner also said that a change in state law would be needed to levy additional sales tax (above the current 0.5%). He said that sales draws from a larger region and that those people use the local transportation system. He pointed out that the current 0.5% County sales tax has been relatively stable, now generating about \$42 million annually.

Sandy Beaupre summarized some data re: wheel tax and local fuel tax, noting that the fuel tax estimates were very rough. She said that a wheel tax would not generate much revenue and is politically unpopular. Ald. Ken Golden said that a wheel tax has been shown to be highly regressive. Beaupre said that a County-wide fuel tax of 1 cent would generate \$3 million per year, but that administrative costs are not assumed (and could be high).

Ald. Ken Golden discussed federal Medicaid transit funding issues, noting that it is complex. He said that these funds pass through the County (about \$2.5 million per year).

Dean Brasser summarized various Madison Metro financing information. He said that he could try to break out the paratransit portion of that, for discussion purposes

Sandy Beaupre said that the MPO is not well understood by the public. LaMarr Billups said that the beneficiaries of a regional transit system should be well articulated, and linked to who pays for it. Warren Onken said that the full regional transit system desired should be considered as these financing options are discussed. He said that smaller start-up systems can be evaluated as the discussions evolve.

Chuck Hicklin said that property taxes are not well received by the general public in Dane County (or elsewhere in Wisconsin). He said that other sources may have problems with limits on levies.

Rod Clark said that some other municipalities in Wisconsin are considering a regional funding source for transit, and that Transport 2020 should monitor these activities (and possibly join forces in the state Legislature at some point). He gave examples of the Southeastern WI, Fox Valley, Eau Claire and LaCrosse. Catherine Debo agreed, noting that the Wisconsin Urban and Rural Transit Association (WURTA) is working on legislation and that some in the Legislature are willing to discuss the issues. She also agreed that property tax burdens are becoming a major problem for transit service delivery. Ken Golden said that Mike King (fmr RPC director) could be asked about the Twin Cities model.

Mike Blaska said that the sources of revenue are limited. He said that a local income tax could be a way to reduce other local burdens. He said that the City of Racine recently conducted a study to explore issues related to services, benefits and tax payments.

Dick Wagner thanked Subcommittee members for their thoughts and asked that the HNTB team provide

some examples of transit finance and governance options at a future meeting.
